In the heart of Downtown Santa Monica lies Tongva Park, a 6-acre community park that provides a place for visitor to relax amongst the urban chaos of the city. Previously a dull, flat parking lot, James Corner Field Operations saw an opportunity to transform the site into "a new destination and gathering place of great social, ecological, and symbolic value."2 Completed in 2013, the design of the public space was largely influenced by community input, with the hopes of producing a park that aligns with the city's culture and ultimately "creating a new heart of Santa Monica."3

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
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

Tongva Park is located in the heart of Santa Monica, a beachfront city on the Westside of Los Angeles. The State Route 1, also known as Pacific Coast Highway, runs north-south along the coast, and connects to the

east-west running Interstate-10 highway. Tongva Park is situated between City Hall, the Interstate-10 highway, and Ocean Avenue.

Pearl of the Pacific

Throughout history, Santa Monica has been know for it's delightful climate, beach views, rolling hills, making it an enjoyable and indemand destination.

The Gabrielino and Chumash Indians, also known as the Tongva people seemed to think so too, as they dwelt in the area for quite some time until Spanish Conquistadors

came across the area in the 16th-century. Later in 1769, while Spanish explorer Gaspar de Portola and his party were on a California expedition, they discovered two water arroyos in what would later be known as the Santa Monica mountains. The springs reminded them of St. Monica and the tears she shed while facing hardships over her son, so they decided to name the city after her.⁴

While designing Tongva Park, it's clear that James Corner was thinking about how he could incorporate the history and surrounding landscape of Santa Monica into the site. His landscape solution utilizes form and vegetation reminiscent of the Santa Monica arroyos and the woven huts and baskets of the Tongva people, paying homage to the roots of the city.




Sketch of Santa Monica, 1875.




