

## **DESIGN NARRATIVE**

Sunset Zone: 22; USDA Hardiness Zone: 10B.

My proposed design of UCLA's Westwood entrance is meant to improve the area visually and designs of this entrance also employed flanking Westwood Blvd with trees like experientially by enhancing shade and views for any observer through planting. As is, the site is Quercus agrifolia or Eucalyptus, therefore I decided to incorporate both species as an homage to heavily exposed to sun with little shade and lackluster planting that has original designs. Planting arrangements compliment the trees both aesthetically and in gradually deteriorated over time. Taking advantage of UCLA's extensive existing plant palette and it's terms of maintenance. Areas around the Quercus respect summer water restrictions and value for research I utilized trees and shrubs already seen around campus or Los incorporate shrubs with inflorescence of UCLA's colors: Blue, White and Yellow. Around the Angeles. My primary intention is to formalize this entrance to campus by flanking Westwood Eucalyptus deglupta, I've incorporated colors commonly seen in it's remarkable bark like Red, Blvd with double rows of Washingtonia filifera. Streets lined with avenues of towering palm Green, and Yellow. Lastly, I've divided the large lawn parkways along Le Conte Ave with plant-lined trees are iconic to Los Angeles however not currently utilized elsewhere on campus. Previous pathways to redirect foot-traffic from planted areas and added more benches for an inviting break.
