PUBLIC PARK SITE HISTORY & IMPRESSION

1888

U.S. President Grover Cleveland granted Tacoma to rights to use 640 acres of undeveloped federal military reservation of Point Defiance as a city park. There weren't many amenities besides campgrounds so the visitors were seasonal and were mostly gathered by the beaches.

1890

A streetcar line to Point Defiance Park was added to provide accessibilty to the gardens and picnic areas.

1899

The construction of the first bear pit started the permanent zoo with herds of elk, deer and bison which developed into the present Point Defiance Zoo & Aquarium

1914

The Pagoda was built as a luxorious amenity that featured a heated waiting room, a first aid station, and marble restrooms staffed by attendants who handed out towels during the summer season.

1950

A Children's Farm Zoo, exhibiting cows, chickens, rabbits, ducks and goats, encouraging iteractin with city children was introduced. Care of the farm animals was a cooperative venture between zoo staff and chapters of the Future Farmers of America.

1984

A major fire destroyed the Boathouse Pavilion complex that was built in 1920s. It was rebuilt and opened in 1988 with expanded facilities for boat storage and rentals.

1990s-present

Point Defiance Park continues to develop as Tacoma's crown jewel of public spaces, fostering partnerships with horticultural, zoological, maritime, conservation and cultural organizations to ensure the vitality of this magnificent peninsula.











REFLECTION

After looking at the many forms of the park, I realized is why it's called dune peninsula because the design of the park has many subtle layers of terrain that looks like desert dunes. Although this park does not have as many programs as I have seen in other parks, the beauty in it's location and views, I think, is enough. I understand now why people would come here to hike, bike, jog and contemplate in this very large, scenic and somewhat quiet park.

PRE-SITE EVALUATIONS AND PERCEPTIONS


SENSORIAL EXPERIENCE


My friend lived at the apartments across from the Americana at Brand, so when we were setting out to leave, my first feeling after she had told me about the place was anxiousness and excitement. We entered through the alleyway in the small plaza with the Home Goods. As we crossed the street, I could feel the change in materials under my feet. I noticed the paving of the street was not cement but brick. It was not a smooth surface and I could hear the cars drive on the street slowly and cautiously with wheels bumping against the paving material. We finally got to the entrance and immediately I could hear Jazz music playing and dogs barking. I see all the different paving and planting materials with an abundance of texture and color. I see the buildings all in very intricate and detailed styles. It was pretty much overwhelming to take in everything that was present. Walking along the sidewalk of the stores, I touched one of the light fixtures to see if it was real, because I was in disbelief that this place was very precise and consistant with its materials. The light fixture was cold and hard and definately made out of materials similar to a regular light fixture on the street, but painted. I walked past by some vendors carts without looking but smelled Wetzle's Pretzles and immediately ordered something. I always order an almond crunch pretzle, it tasted good. Shopping around the entire outdoor plaza, I definately notice that the fountain is the main feature, the faint water sounds, while strolling along the plaza is very relaxing to the ear. The Americana is a place I would spend all day at and go home feeling like I'd just gone to somewhere magical and can't wait to go again.

REFLECTION ON DEE'S, FORM AND FABRIC IN LANDSCAPE ARCHICTURE

- One example of "material, form and fabric" at the Americana at Brand is the plethora of different textures, materials, and
 patterns used in the paving, furniture as well as the architecture. The form of the architecture creates different perspectives of
 the space. The tall structures versus the short structure with the tall enclosing the space and the short opening up the space.
 This pattern is used at Americana at Brand in the areas where groups of people are meant to gather and areas that are more
 private spaces.
- This purposeful design method contributes to the experience because you're creating the rooms that the user enters by manipulating the area around the space. The openness will attract more groups while the more taller structures create spaces that allow people to tuck away from those bigger groups.
- A good public space should integrate design patterns such as change in material texture to guide users to a specific space as well as looking at the furniture and materials within the space to create voids and vingettes for the users to always see something pleasant and memorable. This is why Americana at Brand is so successful in that it is very detailed in every angle and it provides those design patterns to create something memorable for everyone.







This sketch is at Shake Shack. For this sketch, I've studied the area between one side of the "main street" where the train tracks are located and the store fronts. When I was there, on a slow day, people tend to walk on the sidewalks and did not really walk on the "main street" where the train track are. On a busy day, people walked everywhere and had to move off the tracks when the train would come. They knew where it was coming from because of the material difference in the paving. I think this is a great way to use design to communicate with the users. Instead of using signs, Americana at Brand uses paving and this applies to a lot of public spaces and this application is why this place is successful.

MATERIALS






I chose the large planter areas with seat walls to study. This is a great example of how these materials work together whether it's paving or planting material. The brick pattern of the floor is arranged in a way to draw the users to that space. Instead of just a straight shoot running bond across the floor. It's placed parallel to the hexagonal shape of the raised planter and placed in a way for the eye to be drawn to that seating area. I think the textures of the side of the seating area with the floor works wonderfully together and the top cap of the wall is a smooth surface which allows the user to feel comfortable to sit on. The plant materials create a softness that also draws in the users as well.

This material study is of the potted plants that are placed around Americana at Brand. Planters are great beacuse they can be moved around and create a softness to a corner that can't allow a planting bed. It's also great to use it as an object to guide users throughout the space. I sketched an area of where they had these large planters that I think they used to slow down foot traffic. When you're walking on a road and you see an object from afar, you tend to slow down and I think it's smart of them to use these planters to do that.

REFLECTION ON CHING'S ARCHITECTURE FORM, SPACE AND ORDER



AERIAL VIEW OF MAIN FOUNTAIN PLAZA

I chose to reflect on the reading of Ching's Architecture Form, Space and Order. In one of the chapters they discuss hierarchy. I see a hierarchy with the fountain as a main feature and destination or resting point of the entire plaza. It's also acting as a wayfinder for users to locate themselves in the plaza. The blue dots, show a study of people gathering in these specific areas which also creates that hierarchy of space that is desirably used. If you take a look at the map, you can see that most peope will stand or sit under shade. They are clumped in areas with large shade trees or umbrellas. I've noticed that people sit along the fountain and just take photos/videos or stare at the water. They surpringly sit there for a good amount of time even though there isn't shade. People are just drown to water which is why I believe their choice in hierarchy is a good one.

REFLECTION ON INITIAL PERCEPTIONS

Looking back at my initial thoughts on the site, everything I've experienced at Americana at Brand exceeded my expectations. I believe after that first visit, I've gone and visited at least 5 more times. Americana at Brand is very memorable. The whole point of why this space works is because it has created a place for each individual using it's different design patterns of materials and form. It has many little moments within the space to imprint those who visit. It's very much like a fantasy place where you can escape the average person's everyday life. Whether is going there for just a few hours, the vibe is always consistence and you just *know* that you are at Americana at Brand.

PRE-SITE EVALUATION PERCEPTIONS

- From my memory at Old Town Pasadena, my immediate thoughts were that it
 had a sense of history in its buildings. It gave me whimsical vibes walking down
 the streets and it felt like there was a lot of character in the buildings. When were
 Americana at Brand, the styles of the structures were intentional, yet it was still
 able to create the same environment similar to Old Town Pasadena.
- Another memory I had at Old Town Pasadena was that it felt safe to walk around the neighborhood and there were many people outside going about their day. Some of the streets had pedestrian friendly sidewalks.




ACCESS & LINKAGES

COMFORT & IMAGE


- Safety is being able to feel comfortable in a space without having anxiety, doubt or worry about something or someone surprising you or causing harm.

USES AND ACTIVITIES


- I think the reason people visit Old Town Pasadena because it's kind of like a larger scaled version of Americana at Brand with a lot of stores that people go to on the regular.


- I think being able to feel comfortable interacting with strangers is having the space to do so without feeling restricted or hazardous.



INTEGRATED DESIGN



A Foci, as Dee explains, is a main focus or feature that is often revisted. It's the center of the space that draws people to gather in that space. At Old Town Pasadena, I think it's One Colorado, and at Americana at Brand, it's the main fountain. Even within One Colorado, you can see that it create a perspective that draws people into the alleyways with decorative light fixtures and rows of potted plants.



MATERIAL DETAILS

- I studied the paving of the crosswalk at E Colorado and Raymond Ave.
- The use of material is smart to show people that this street is important and is where most traffic occurs.
- The change in material guides people to be here.
- This street is also used every year for the Rose Parade.




REFLECTION

POST OCCUPANCY EVALUATION





ACCESS & LINKAGES









Chinatown has very cultural aspects to the buildings when you get closer to Chinatown Central Plaza. Like in Dee's readings, she talks about the Foci and that is the meeting place or center of the space that people are drawn to. In the image, I show an alleyway with chinese lanterns hanging as decoration and to light up the space. I think these parts of Chinatown are the most memorable beacause of the details of material and culture. Much like Americana at Brand, the details gives a memorable impression.

I think the storefronts and vendors that are present in Chinatown are interactive. Although the sidewalks are narrow at times because of the storefronts that bleed into the public space, it provides that interactive street life that Old Town Pasadena showcases. It would be great if vegetation was considered in some plazas, for example fruit trees that people can pick off of and can provide some sort of community connections within this area.


REFLECTION

Chinatown shows accessibility, activies and sociability for a space but it lacks in comfort and good image in some areas.





COMFORT & IMAGES

There's absolutely no service when you enter the park so you only have a paper map provided by the visitor center, so if anything happens, no one will know. The "greenery" are dry looking desert shrubs and there is little to no shade.

USES & ACTIVITIES



Joshua Tree is special because there are quite a few airbnb's in large private lots that are available for rent just west of the park's entrance. Camping with designated camp sites are available in the park, but having that unique desert airbnb with quirky characteristics has been extremely popular. It's a great way to escape the city any time of the year and not have to worry about the weather during the hottest/coldest times of the desert.

SOCIALBILITY



Volunteer work is important to the park as the desert is a living space. With 3.5 million annual visitors, there are many people who assist in visitor management or collect scientific data. They are also actively searching for volunteers with opportunities such as expertise as a native plant specialist.

- Joshua Tree National Park is most comparable to MacArthur Park because

Joshua Tree National Park has many stunning views, trails, and campsites, but not everyone can access the park. Having a public bus transit to Joshua Tree would allow many people to be able to visit the park. I also feel that adding another program that can incorporate the arts could be something to bring people together. For example, Desert X is a non-profit organization that locates various sites in Palm Springs to display selected artist's installations. The users are given coordinates to actively search each site's like a scavenger hunt. It's a great way to bring people together to experience the arts in the surrounding space of the vast desert.
